

# Allergies, Conjunctivitis, and Blood-Derived Eye Serum

*A practical overview for veterinary teams and pet owners*

Allergy-related conjunctivitis can leave the eyes red, irritated, watery, and uncomfortable. Sourced eye serum is often selected as an adjunctive support therapy to help soothe the ocular surface and reinforce tear-film health while the underlying allergy is being addressed.

## Why allergies affect the eyes

Allergies are a common cause of eye irritation in both dogs and cats. Pets with allergic conjunctivitis often show signs such as red eyes, squinting, excessive tearing, pawing at the face, and a thick or watery discharge. These symptoms occur because the delicate tissue lining the eyelids and covering the eye (the conjunctiva) becomes inflamed when exposed to allergens such as pollen, dust, grasses, or environmental irritants.

One treatment option your veterinarian may recommend is sourced eye serum; a specialized eye drop made from natural biological components that help support healing of the eye's surface. Many veterinarians find this therapy especially helpful for pets with chronic irritation or allergy-related conjunctivitis.

## What is sourced eye serum

Sourced eye serum is typically produced using sterile serum derived from blood that contains many of the same natural healing substances found in tears. These substances include growth factors, vitamins, antibodies, and proteins that help maintain a healthy ocular surface.

Because the serum closely mimics the body's natural tear film, it can provide nourishment and protection to the eye while reducing inflammation caused by allergies.

## Why it works well for allergy-related cases

Traditional allergy treatments are aimed at controlling the underlying inflammatory response. Depending on the patient, that may include environmental management, systemic or topical anti-inflammatory therapy, antihistamines, or treatment of concurrent skin disease. Blood-derived eye serum serves a different purpose: it helps support the eye directly at the tissue level.

In allergy-related conjunctivitis and ocular surface irritation, veterinarians may choose serum because it can help supplement the tear film, improve surface comfort, and provide a more biologically active form of lubrication. This can be especially helpful in patients with recurrent seasonal flare-ups, chronic irritation, or visible surface stress.

## When is sourced eye serum recommended

Your veterinarian may recommend sourced eye serum when:

- Allergic conjunctivitis is persistent or severe
- Standard lubricating drops are not providing enough relief
- The surface of the eye needs additional support for healing
- Your pet has recurrent eye irritation during allergy seasons

In many cases, serum drops are used alongside other treatments such as allergy management, antihistamines, or anti-inflammatory medications to provide the best overall result.

## A note for equine cases

In horses, allergic and insect-related irritation can create substantial conjunctival and periocular inflammation during high-exposure seasons. These cases may benefit from a plan that addresses both the trigger and the ocular surface. When used under veterinary direction, serum can be a practical way to provide added support to the eye during these episodes.

## Helping your pet feel better

If your dog or cat suffers from itchy, red, or watery eyes due to allergies, sourced eye serum can be an effective way to help soothe irritation and support the eye's natural healing process. With consistent use as directed by your veterinarian, many pets experience improved comfort, reduced redness, and healthier eyes.

If you notice persistent eye redness, squinting, or discharge in your pet, it is always best to schedule an examination. Early treatment can prevent more serious eye problems and keep your pet comfortable and healthy.
